Jae Kennedy is a disability advocate and Professor of Health Policy and Administration in the Elson S. Floyd School of Medicine at Washington State University. Please join us to hear him speak on the following:

- 1) To introduce the public health/health disparities framework and discuss its limited use in discussing the population health of adults with disabilities.
- 2) To demonstrate the pervasive and significant differences in social determinants of health among working-age (18-65) adults with disabilities, using survey data from the 2018 National Health Interview Survey.
- 3) To argue that people with disabilities are a distinct minority group that experience systemic social stigma and institutional discrimination that is conceptually distinct from their chronic health conditions, and that this minority status contributes to observed disability disparities in health outcomes.

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
